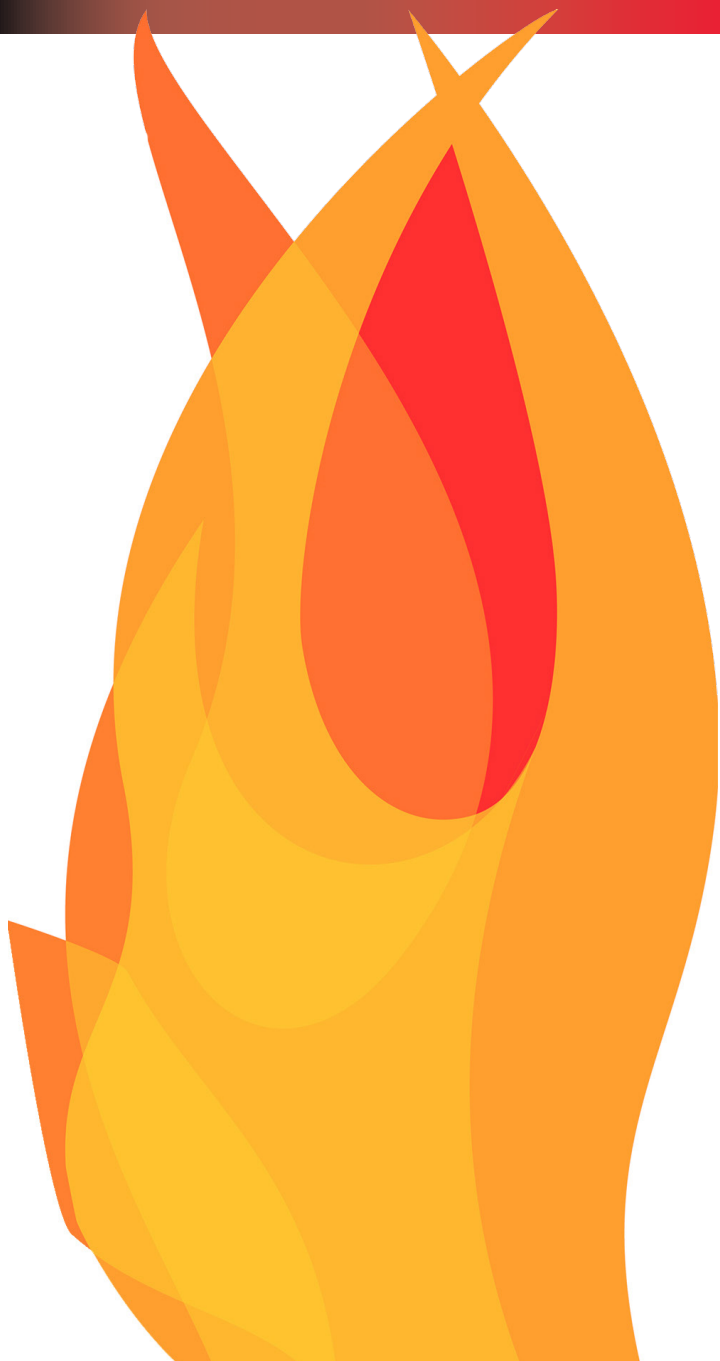
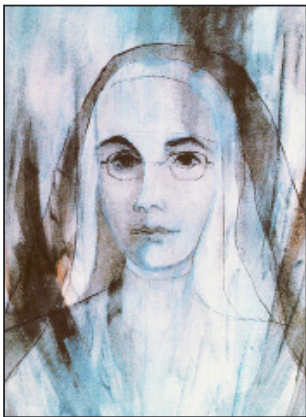

Charism is a distinct spirit that animates a religious congregation and gives it a particular character. It's a call to **manifest the Gospel** in a unique way.

The charism of the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary flows from gifts that God gave to Blessed Marie Rose Durocher and the other early foundresses of the congregation.

That charism is rooted in the **primacy of God's love** and the **power of education** to develop the potential God gave each of us.

Charism provides the **spirit** and **motivation** with which the Sisters, and like-minded women and men such as SNJM Associates, Lay Consecrated and friends, approach life and choose ministries.

the SNJM Constitutions define charism

Three sections of the congregation's "Constitutions and Rules" outline a charism that is flexible and can speak to changing times. **Which statement speaks the most strongly to you?**

1 "We are called each day in the saving Name of Jesus to collaborate in the Church's mission of education. This mission aims at the full development of the human person. With those we meet we experience the mystery of Jesus Christ, knowing that He is already among us and that through His Resurrection we are called to a new life."

—Section 11

2 "Education in the faith demands of us active involvement in the promotion of justice. In this spirit and according to the teachings of the Church, our educational endeavors have a special concern for the poor and disadvantaged."

—Section 13

3 "We are challenged by the Gospel and by the needs of our society to unite our efforts with those around us to attain for all people conditions of life more equitable and more worthy of human dignity."

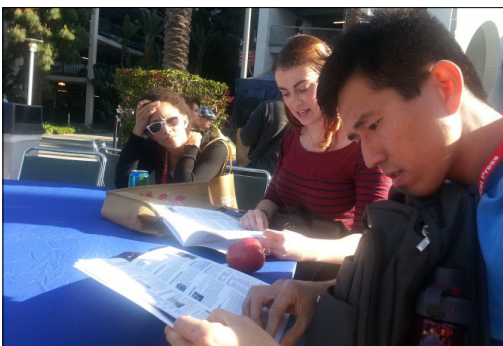
